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HCB: 100 photographs from the Henri Cartier-Bresson Foundation 11 November 2011



Paris – Christie's France is honoured to be organizing the sale of 100 photographic prints by Henri Cartier-Bresson from the famous photographer's Foundation. This is the first time that images from his archives, considered to be good by Henri Cartier-Bresson, have been offered at auction. This selection is estimated to fetch around 1.4 million euros.

Henri Cartier-Bresson - "The eye of the century"

Henri Cartier Bresson (1908-2004) made photo-journalism an art form. In 1947, along with Robert Capa, David Seymour, William Vandivert and Georges Rodger, he founded the Magnum photo agency.

In the early 1930s, HCB returned from his travels with surrealist snapshots which would forge his legend. He invented a style – the "decisive moment" – a combination of exuberant life and carefully controlled geometry. He thereby brought credibility to photo-journalism and made "imagination based on nature" an ethic and an aesthetic. In 1952, he exhibited his definition of photography in a book with the revealing title "Images à la sauvette" ("images on the fly", published in English as "The Decisive Moment"). He was one of the legendary figures of photography in the 20th-century, through which he passed with an eye on the great historical landmarks that was consistently off-beat and revealing.

Henri Cartier-Bresson Foundation

The Henri Cartier-Bresson Foundation was set up in 2003 by the photographer himself, Martine Franck and their daughter Mélanie in order to preserve Henri Cartier-Bresson's work, facilitate knowledge and study of that work and promote its exposure to other creative professionals. Every two years the Foundation also awards the HCB Prize, in the form of support for creativity. The Foundation's articles of association include the possibility of selling signed prints in order to raise funds, subject to the strict condition that identical prints are included in the inalienable archive. In order to acquire a larger building, the Foundation is offering works by the photographer for sale for the first time and has selected Christie's to arrange the auction.

All of Cartier-Bresson in 100 photos

The whole of Henri-Cartier Bresson's career is here in 100 photographs – from 1929, with an image taken in *Rouen* (estimate: €10,000-€15,000), to one of the latest works *Helmut Newton*, *Parc Monceau* in 2000 (estimate: €5,000-7,000).



And it also represents the world as seen by Henri Cartier-Bresson. Through his travels, which gave him an overview of the whole of the 20th century, discovering Mexico (Mexico 1934, estimate: €6,000-€9,000), the United States (*Arizona*, *États-Unis*, 1947, estimate: €8,000-€12,000), Spain, (*Séville, Espagne*, 1933, estimate: €8,000-€12,000), the United Kingdom (*Couronnement du Roi Georges VI, Trafalgar Square, Londres*, 12 May 1937, estimate: €20,000-€30,000). He also explored the Far East during a three year stay there: in India (*Camp de refugies, Punjab, Inde*, 1947, estimate: €8,000-€12,000), China (*Pékin, Chine*, 1958, estimate: €8,000-€12,000), Indonesia (*Ubud, Bali, Indonésie*, 1949, estimate: €30,000-€50,000). He was also the first photographer allowed into the USSR following the détente (*Moscou, Union Soviétique*, 1954, estimate: €10,000-€15,000).

He criss-crossed France, always in search of that fraction of a second offering the unique moment. In 1970, he published the book "Vive la France", which would be followed by an exhibition at the Grand Palais in Paris. *Marseille, France*, 1932, (estimate: €6,000-€9,000), *Brie, France*, 1968, (estimate: €10,000-€15,000), *Près de Juvisy-sur-Orge, Essonne, France*, 1955, (estimate: €20,000-€30,000) are all testimony of his travels.

Henri Cartier-Bresson's artistic and intellectual universe is laid out for us in this incredible selection: Albert Camus, Paris, 1944 (estimate: €5,000-€7,000); Pablo Picasso à son domicile, Rue des Grands Augustins, Paris, 1944 (estimate: €10,000-€15,000); Palette d'Henri Matisse, Vence, France, 1944 (estimate: €30,000-€50,000).

These travels and encounters are all historical moments experienced by the artist: *Mur de Berlin, Allemagne de l'Ouest*, 1962 (estimate: €5,000-€7,000); *Derniers jours du Kouomintang, Shanghai, Chine*, December 1948-January 1949 (estimate: €6,000-€9,000); *Funérailles de Gandhi, Dehli, Inde*, 1948 (estimate: €6,000-€9,000).

However, his gaze was particularly drawn to moments of daily life: *Asilah, Maroc, Espagnol*, 1933 (estimate: €8,000-€12,000); *Dans un train Roumanie*, 1975 (estimate: €8,000-€12,000); *Prostituées, Calle Cuauhtemoctzin, Mexique*, 1934 (estimate: €10,000-€15,000). These are all "decisive moments" which will excite the interest of collectors.



These 100 photographs are each works representing the artist's techniques and printing. Including both "vintage" prints as well as more recent ones, all originals (i.e. under Henri Cartier-Bresson's control, since no prints have been produced for collections since his death). All the prints are signed and marked on the back with the Foundation's stamp. *Beaumont Newhall, New-York, Etats-Unis*, 1947 (estimate: €10,000-€15,000); *Lucian Freud, Londres*, 1997, contemporary print (estimate: €5,000-€7,000). This auction will particularly be an opportunity to discover an exceptional print of the iconic Cartier-Bresson image *Derrière la gare St Lazare, Paris*, taken in 1932 and of which this lot, dated 1946, is the oldest print known (estimate: €120,000-€180,000)
