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THE OLDEST RUM EVER OFFERED AT AUCTION To Be Sold at Christie's London in December

From The Cellar of Harewood House
All Proceeds to Benefit the Geraldine Connor Foundation





London – Christie's is pleased to announce that a selection of the oldest rum ever offered at auction will be presented at the *Finest and Rarest Wines and Spirits including Rare Madeira* sale on the 12 & 13 December 2013. Recently rediscovered in the cellar of Harewood House in Leeds, the historic collection comprises 12 bottles of 'Light' and 'Dark' Rum, which date back to 1780. The exceptional provenance and quality of these spirits provide international connoisseurs and enthusiasts around the world with a rare opportunity. The collection is expected to realise in the region of £12,000.

David Elswood, International Director of Christie's Wine in Europe and Asia said:

"Christie's is delighted to be offering this rare and unique 1780 rum from Harewood House - the oldest we have ever seen and at 230 years of age, just 14 years younger than Christie's wine auctions which commenced in 1766".

The proceeds from this outstanding collection will go towards the Geraldine Connor Foundation, established in 2012 to continue her inspirational work, as a teacher, with disenfranchised young people in the performing arts. Born in Britain, raised in Trinidad, Connor was a major figure in Yorkshire's West Indian community, heavily involved in carnival and the Steel band movement, and creator of the legendary and spectacular piece of musical theatre, *Carnival Messiah*, last performed at Harewood in 2007, the Bicentenary of the Abolition of the Slave Trade.

HISTORY OF THE HAREOOD HOUSE CELLAR

The story of the Harewood Rum begins in 1711, when Henry Lascelles, aged just 21, travelled from Yorkshire to the West Indies to pursue the family business of sugar, cotton, tobacco – and rum. By 1780, the bulk of the Lascelles' West Indian property was in Barbados, including the estates that now belonging to one of the best-known Bajan rum producers Mount Gay. It is believed that the Harewood Rum came from that island. The cellar records show large quantities of wines and spirits bought and consumed at the time and subsequently Harewood House entertained lavishly and frequently, but surprisingly the rum was consumed quite sparingly: only one or two bottles a year, with the exception of one day in December 1805 when a startling eight bottles were drunk. By the start of the 20th century the rum seems to have been more or less forgotten, a drink that had gone out of fashion, the bottles still stored in the same bin numbers, but hidden away on a high shelf at the back of the cellar. The bottles were discovered by chance in 2011 by established wine trade professionals Mark Lascelles and Andy Langshaw, while conducting an inventory of the cellar. The remarkable bottles are almost invisible now under a thick black coating of cobwebs and dust.

The very first record of the Harewood Rum (described as Cane Spirit) is in a cellar book entry dated July 1805, which lists "226 bottles, dark and light 1780" stored in two bins in the cool, damp, vaulted cellar of Harewood House, Bin 9 for the dark, Bin 12 for the light.

A UNIQUE OFFERING OF MADEIRA

Further highlights from the sale include a unique range of Madeira, directly sourced from the Island of Madeira, which is offered for the first time at auction. This extremely rare group comprises 157 lots, with estimates ranging from £200 up to £3,500, primarily from the private cellars of the Blandy and Borges family reserves. Leading this offering are two extremely rare bottles of "Terratez" JCA & CA, 1715, believed to be the oldest dated Madeira in existence (estimate:£2,500-3,500, illustrated right).

MADEIRA

Madeira is the name of both the volcanic Portuguese island off the coast of North Africa and the fortified wine made there. The four classic types of Madeira are named after the grapes from which they are made: Sercial, Verdelho, Bual and Malvasia. All four of these types of Madeira are still in production today and typically have high natural acidity. The majority of Madeira is made from a grape called *tinta negra mole* or *tinta*.
