A SUMPTUOUS COLLECTION FROM HERMITAGE ANTIQUES, PIMLICO AT CHRISTIE'S SOUTH KENSINGTON IN APRIL

The Hermitage Antiques Collection Tuesday, 4 April 2006 at 10.30am



South Kensington – A treasure trove of period Biedermeier, Russian, Continental and Oriental furniture, chandeliers and objets d'art from Hermitage Antiques in Pimlico Road will be offered in a sumptuous single owner sale on 4 April 2006 at Christie's South Kensington. With estimates ranging from £200-£20,000, this beautiful collection of over 450 lots has been built up over 30 years of trading and is estimated to fetch in excess of £750,000.

Hermitage Antiques was established by Bernard Vieux-Pernon in 1970 in Camden Passage and later moved in 1974 to Pimlico Road, an oasis of wonderful shops and larger-than-life antiques trade characters. Originally an eclectic mix of French Provincial, Oriental and European furniture and objects, Bernard

was inspired to change the direction of Hermitage Antiques following a holiday visit to a diplomat friend in Moscow. Visiting the amazing treasures of St Petersburg and Moscow and their palaces had a great impact and Bernard returned to Britain with a love and passion for Russian and Biedermeier furniture.

Amongst the 450 pieces of furniture and objects is a sparkling selection of lighting including a Swedish Empire ormolu and glass six light chandelier, *circa* 1815 (estimate: £3,000-5,000) and a spectacular Gustavian ormolu and glass eight light chandelier from the late 18th century (estimate: £25,000-35,000). Decorative items for the modern interior include an Empire ormolu and musical mantel clock for the Turkish market, *circa* 1815 (estimate: £5,000-8,000); a French bronze bust of the Roman Emperor Caracalla, *circa* 1880 (estimate: £2,000-3,000) and a pair of bronze models of the

Warwick vase, *circa* 1870 (estimate: £800-1,200).

Reflecting the Russian flavour of Hermitage Antiques includes a Russian giltwood and gesso console table, second quarter 19th century (estimate: £4,000-6,000); a Russian mahogany three fold screen from the early 19th century (estimate: £4,000-6,000) and an imposing Russian Karelian birch seven piece suite, second half 19th century (estimate: £10,000-15,000). Russian paintings include hand coloured engravings of Alexander Premier, Emperor of Russia; and Alexandria, Empress of Russia , Russian School, 19th century (estimate: £1,200-1,800) together with portraits by German artist Rudolf Friedrich Karl Suhrlandt of Friedrich Franz I, Grand Duke of Mecklenburg-Schwerin (1756-1837) (estimate: £3,500-4,500) and a portrait of Mrs Campion, Rachel, daughter of Richard Duffield from the circle of William Larkin (Fl.*circa*.1580s-1690) (estimate: £5,000-8,000).

Even though Bernard Vieux-Pernon has decided to close Hermitage Antiques and to sell the collection at Christie's South Kensington, he now wants to deal differently. He will carry on dealing in antiques, and sourcing pieces for his clients, both private and trade.
