Japanese and Korean Art and Art for the Way of Tea realized \$6,610,180 with as a top lot the magnificent and massive Choson period full moon jar which realized \$1,272,000, setting a world auction record for white porcelain from the Choson period. The Korean section of the sale performed extremely well with the rare 18th century album with calligraphy and landscapes achieving \$240,000 while a painting by Lee Daiwon was acquired for \$102,000. The Japanese section was led with the superb Pine Trees in Moonlight, an extraordinary pair of screens which achieved \$880,000. Art for the Way of Tea, a single owner collection, was led by the spectacular rectangular bowl from the Momoyama period."
