Hong Kong – Christie's, the world leading auction house for extraordinary jewels for over 14 years, is pleased to announce the Spring sale of magnificent jewels on May 28th. Featuring 345 lots estimated to achieve in excess of US\$56 million, this sale features a number of important and eagerly-awaited highlights, including the largest colourless diamond seen at auction in nearly 20 years.

DIAMONDS



Announced earlier this spring, the leading highlight in *Jewels: Hong Kong Sale* is an exceedingly rare F colour, internally flawless VVS1 diamond of 101.27cts – the largest colourless diamond to appear on the auction market in 18 years and the largest colourless diamond to ever be sold at auction in Hong Kong. Recently mounted in a striking tiara (*image left*), this diamond is the most highly-anticipated lot in the sale and is expected to realize in

excess of HK\$47,000,000 / US\$6 million.

Other colourless diamonds of particular note include two important brilliant-cut diamonds: an unmounted D colour, potentially flawless diamond of 16.04 carats (estimate: HK\$ 16,800,000-20,000,000 / US\$ 2,100,000-2,500,000) and a D colour, internally flawless diamond of 12.15 carats

(estimate: HK\$9,000-000-12,000,000 / US\$1,100,000-1,500,000). With excellent polish and excellent symmetry, each stone is rated excellent for its cut

grade by the GIA. Such large and perfectly round diamonds are extremely limited in the market today and remain unparalleled in terms of properties and price.



Green diamonds rank as one of the rarest colours in diamonds, second only to red. Indeed, millions of years are required to render even a pale green body colour to a 1 carat diamond, making the astonishing 10.63 carat diamond offered both extraordinary and especially rare (*image left*). In a league of its own, this diamond is a rare collector's specimen that is expected to sell for HK\$16,000,000-24,000,000/US\$2,000,000-3,000,000.

Blue diamonds remain among the most prized and this season Christie's Hong Kong is offering a fancy blue diamond of 7.18 carats (estimate: HK\$14,400,000-20,000,000/ US\$1,800,000-2,500,000).

JADEITE



Leading the jadeite offerings is a magnificent pair of jadeite cabochon ear studs (*image right*, estimate: HK\$18,000,000-25,000,000/ US\$2,300,000-3,200,000). Jadeite, the only cryptocrystalline precious stone, is composed of numerous tiny crystals which interlock to a greater or lesser degree, absorbing light so that the stone becomes increasingly opaque as it grows in thickness. These remarkable jadeite cabochons show a high degree of translucency and purity while retaining a most desirable

thickness. This requires the perfect texture, zhong, and the highest cutting skill, making the present lot extremely rare. Combined with a vitreous translucency, these stones radiate a remarkable depth of colour, a bright and intense emerald green so typical of Burmese jadeite. Further adding to their significance is their strikingly grand size. It is extremely difficult to find a large pair of cabochons of such graceful proportions that are matched in translucency, purity, and in evenness of colour. Internally luminous and clear, these perfectly-formed jadeite cabochons are among the most important jewels offered this season.

Another highlight is a superb jadeite bead necklace (*image right*, estimate: HK\$16,800,000 - 2,500,000 / US\$2,150,000-3,000,000). Jadeite bead necklaces have always represented the ultimate in jadeite collecting, as it is extremely difficult to fine a necklace with well-matched beads. What makes this necklace so exceptional is that it was carved from a single piece of gemquality rough. The necklace consists of 73 perfect beads – each matching

in colour and shape. Adding to the rarity is the high translucency of each intensely-saturated vivid green bead – a combination that is both valuable and rare.

IMPORTANT COLOURED GEMS



The sale will also present collectors with an array of important coloured gems, with a number of significant emeralds. Leading the selection is a tremendous pair of emerald and diamond ear pendants set with Colombian emeralds weighing 9.12 and 8.84 carats and which carry a historical and distinguished provenance tracing back to the Romanov dynasty. The current emeralds formed part of magnificent emerald and diamond necklace which Tsar Alexander II (1818-1881) bequeathed to his daughter-in-law, the Grand Duchess Maria Pavlovna Vladimir (1854-1920) who was married to his son, the Grand Duke Vladimir Alexandrovich (1847-1909). This tremendous necklace was set with a 107.72 carat emerald, reputed to

be the second largest emerald in the world. Her son, Grand Duke Boris Vladimirovich (1877-1943) inherited his mother's emeralds upon her death in France in 1920, and in 1927 sold this exquisite necklace to Louis Cartier. The necklace appeared again on the market in 1947 when it was purchased from the Payne Whitney family by one of the great jewellery connoisseurs of the 20th century who later reconfigured the necklace and sold it to Pierre Cartier. The necklace was eventually sold to the Rockefeller family and was last seen at public auction in 1971. The necklace has since been disassembled and the present pair of square-cut emeralds was sold at Christie's in St. Moritz in 1990 in a fitted pink case by Cartier. Presently, the emeralds are set into an exquisite pair of ear pendants by Edmond Chin of Etcetera, each suspending a beautiful natural drop-shaped pearl (*image above*, estimate: HK\$10,500,000-12,000,000 /US\$1,300,000 – 2,000,000). With over a hundred years of aristocratic and royal associations, this splendid jewel has a fascinating Russian history.
