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
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FASHION & ART COME TOGETHER AT CHRISTIE'S LONDON IN JUNE: WORKS FROM THE ERNESTO ESPOSITO COLLECTION

London – Fashion and art come together at Christie's London with *Works From The Ernesto Esposito Collection* which will be offered in the sales of **Post-War and Contemporary Art** on 20 and 21 June 2007. A world renowned art collector and a visionary shoe designer who has worked with the fashion houses of Marc Jacobs, Chloe and Louis Vuitton, Mr Esposito was a close personal friend of Andy Warhol and the last person to be painted by the artist. Comprising 12 works spanning five decades from the 1960s to the present day, the selection includes well-known artists such as Andy Warhol, Peter Doig, Keith Haring and Mel Ramos and is expected to realise in excess of $f_{..4}$ million.

"We are delighted to have been entrusted with a selection of works from such an important collection. Contemporary Art provides Ernesto Esposito with a source of much inspiration and over the past thirty years his discerning eye has seen him thoughtfully assemble one of the finest contemporary art collections in Europe," says Pilar Ordovas, Head of Post War & Contemporary Art at Christie's London. Working from the backstage of the most prestigious fashion houses, Italian-born Ernesto Esposito commenced his career as a shoe designer in the 1970s for one of the most prestigious shoe makers in the world, Sergio Rossi, with whom he worked together for more than 15 years. In the 1980s, Mr Esposito joined the team of the young Marc Jacobs where he collaborated for nearly ten years and he has since worked with Chloe, Sonia Rykiel and Louis Vuitton.

Leading the selection of five works from *Works From The Ernesto Esposito Collection* offered in **Christie's Post War & Contemporary Art Evening Sale** on 20 June 2007 is Andy Warhol's (1928-1987), *Vesuvius*, 1985 (estimate: £1,000,000-1,500,000). Living in Naples, Italy with Mount Vesuvius nearby, the work is a fitting testament to the close personal friendship Mr Esposito had with Andy Warhol. Warhol was drawn to the denigrated products of consumer society and his Pop work *Campbell's tomato juice box*, 1964 (estimate: £150,000-200,000) saw him offend the sensibilities of an audience accustomed to thinking of art as an intimate medium for conveying emotion. Pop sensibility combines with quintessential all-American apple pie in Mel Ramos' (b. 1935) *Miss American Legion*, 1964 (estimate: £500,000-800,000), in which Ramos' trademark image of a scantily clad 'pin-up' girl is depicted as if playing a role in a commercial publicising the American Legion.

Lisa Yuskavage's (b. 1962) *Dark Garden II*, 2003 (estimate: £300,000-400,000) is a strange and brooding picture filled with a sinister sensuality and sexuality. A deliberate and postfeminist play on the idea of representations of women as objects of desire, Yuskavage takes the stereotype, twisting and exaggerating it in order to somehow devalue it. A similar sinister atmosphere can be found in Peter Doig's (b. 1959) *Target*, 2000 (estimate: £700,000-900,000). Doig uses old snapshots and film stills as the sources for his art and his works are often fuelled by a stifling, even sinister atmosphere, as though the pictures were photos lying around an abandoned house, or a frozen moment from a larger narrative of which the viewer can never really discover anything.

A further seven works from *Works From The Ernesto Esposito Collection* will be offered in Christie's **Post-War and Contemporary Art Day Sale** on 21 June 2007. Pop Art is well represented throughout the collection and works by Andy Warhol dominate with *Dollar Sign*, 1981 (estimate: £120,000-180,000) and *Hammer and Sickle*, 1976 (estimate: £150,000-200,000) leading the sale. Works by other Pop artists include American Keith Haring (1958-1990), *Untitled (Mr. Softee*), 1985 (estimate: £120,000 - 180,000) and Japanese artist Yoshitomo Nara's (b. 1960), *Tamago*, 2000 (estimate: £150,000-200,000)

Amongst the selection of conceptual and sculptural pieces from the collection is Dan Flavin's (1933-1996) red and pink fluorescent light *Untitled (to Barbara Wool)* which was executed in 1970 and is number one from an edition of three (estimate: £150,000-200,000). American sculptor Donald Judd (1928-1994) is represented by *Untitled, circa* 1991 (estimate:

£200,000-300,000) and conceptual pioneer, Sol Lewitt (1928-2007) by *Hanging Complex Form*, 1989 (estimate: £100,000-150,000).
