Max Bernheimer, International Department Head for Christie's Antiquities Department said: "Today's fantastic results not only confirmed that the market for Antiquities is as robust as ever, but it also firmly reestablished Christie's leadership in the field. The sale started with a big bang when the 33 lots of Egyptian art collected by Gustave Jéquier (1868-1946) soared to more than \$1.5 million, nearly tripling the pre-sale low estimate. Four of the Jéquier pieces made the Top Ten, led by the colossal quartzite portrait of the Pharaoh Nectanebo II, which sold for \$350,500." **Molly Morse Limmer, Head of Sale** added: "The lively buying activity was truly international and many lots from all sectors of the antiquities market performed far above pre-sale expectations. Several significant lots have sold after-sale, including \$542,500 for the Sumerian terracotta head, which is not reflected in the Top Ten list."
