FROM TORRES TO FENDER: CHRISTIE'S SHOWCASES THE HISTORY OF GUITAR MAKING

Christie's Features The Most Valuable Selection Of Guitars At Auction Since The Landmark Sale Of Eric Clapton's Guitars For The Crossroads Centre









New York – Christie's bi-annual *Fine Musical Instruments Sale* on October 12 will offer an exciting and extensive range of fretted and stringed instruments, including the largest number of guitars ever offered in a various owner sale to date. Of the 252 lots, the sale will offer 44 fretted instruments, including an exquisite classical guitar by Antonio de Torres and a 1951 Fender "Nocaster" solid-body electric guitar, which will certainly be one of the most desirable guitars in the sale. Among stringed instruments, a superb Giuseppe Guarneri 'del Gesù' violin, circa 1720, is a rare gem from a master second only to Antonio Stradivari. From acoustic to electric guitars, mandolins to violins, this sale confirms Christie's position as the world's leading auctioneer of fine musical instruments.

Guitars

For performance, and construction, the Spaniards reign supreme in the world of classical guitars. From Manuel Ramirez to Ignacio Fleta, the supremacy of the Spanish makers would have unachievable if not for the influence of Antonio de Torres. Through his ingenuity, Torres (1817-1892) transformed the modern classical guitar from an accompaniment to a solo instrument. Torres recognized the importance of the symbiotic relationship between musician and maker, and put his instruments in the hands of leading Spanish guitar virtuosos.

This 1864 guitar (estimate: \$100,000-150,000) possesses the classical beauty traditionally associated with Torres's guitars. More jewel-like than any other Torres guitar, this magnificent example, was created for the maker's personal use, as it remained until 1869 when it was sold to Francesco Tárrega. As a guitarist and composer with unparalleled talent, Tárrega (1852-1909) helped transform the guitar to a concert instrument. The tradition of guitar virtuoso united with this guitar continued on with its next owner, Maria Luisa Anido (1907-1996). Purchased in 1917 for the illustrious Argentine guitarist, the instrument remained in Buenos Aires for nearly seventy years. During the mid 1980s the guitar returned to Spain when it was purchased by the Collection of Prat Pallares. The current owner, an American Collector and connoisseur, came into possession of the guitar in 2003.

Another exciting instrument offered is a "Nocaster" solid-body electric guitar by Fender. The sale's opening lot should be one of the most sought after pieces among the pantheon of solid-body electric guitars to be offered in recent years (estimate: \$30,000-50,000).

Lower price points for new collectors can also be found, among them a 1969 Fender Mustang, solid-body electric guitar bearing a red racing stripe (estimate: \$1,000-1,500). Fine works are also present by C.F. Martin, Gibson, D'Angelico, and Hausser.



Violins

Grandson to the famed Cremonese master, Andrea Guarneri, Giuseppe Guarneri 'de Gesù' stands alone in rivaling the other 18th century master Antonio Stradivari. The most celebrated member of the Guarneri family, Giuseppe's violins have been used by some of the most illustrious violinists including virtuoso Niccolò Paganini, whose favorite instrument, known as 'Il Cannone' was a Guarneri 'del Gesù' violin of 1743. The violin offered for auction was made in 1720 and has been the primary instrument for both solo and chamber music for a professional musician (estimate: \$550,000-750,000).
