The Roman marble statue of the Emperor Hadrian soared to \$902,500 over a pre-sale estimate of \$350,000-550,000. A private European Collection of Egyptian art was highlighted by a superb bronze figure of Osiris, which tripled its pre-sale low estimate realizing \$422,500. From the same collection was an exquisite Greek bronze Aphrodite which achieved \$242,500, far above its estimate of \$100,000-150,000." **Molly Morse Limmer, Head of Sale, Antiquities, New York added:** "Private and institutional buyers dominated the top ten, including the top lot from the separate Ancient Jewelry sale, which was an Etruscan carnelian scarab engraved with Bellerophon and the Chimaera that sold for \$86,500. We look forward to continued success in 2009, beginning with splendid ancient objects from the Collection of Yves Saint-Laurent in Paris in February."
