"The Vincennes celestial blue Ewer known as "Pot de Monsieur de la Bouexière" is a most important addition to our display related to the Grand Salon of the Hôtel de la Bouexière. The ewer, which may have been first owned by Madame de Pompadour, masterfully summarizes the essence of what French porcelain from the period of Louis XV was about, in terms of extravagant colors and ornamental refinement to the highest degree. It also provides a link between the patron who commissioned the Hôtel de la Bouexière and the prevailing taste for Vincennes and Sèvres porcelain in the mid 18th century. We are extremely grateful to Carolyn Groves and the Groves Foundation which provided the funds for the acquisition and conservation of the Grand Salon and which has now also enabled us to acquire the Ewer."
