LONDON – Christie's inaugural *British Impressionism Evening Sale* on 22 November 2017 will present a strong selection of work from leading artists working in Britain from the late 19th century onwards, who were inspired by French Impressionism and plein-air painting. In the spirit of their Pre-Raphaelite predecessors, they were reacting against what went before, and these artists brought fresh air, light and a new fluidity into the Victorian age. Like their fellow artists in France and North America, such as Monet, Pissarro and John Singer Sargent, this varied group of artists abandoned the formal and highly-structured training of the prevailing schools and academies, and sought a new, more relaxed form of painting using rapid, broken brushstrokes to capture the nuances of light and shade. They sought inspiration across the channel in the rural artists' colonies such as Grez-sur-Loing and Pont Aven, where they painted everyday life en plein air. The sale will be led by *Evening Song* by Sir George Clausen (estimate: £1,200,000-1,800,000), who along with fellow artist John Lavery, visited Grez and encountered the inspirational teachings of

Jules Bastien-Lepage. Additional highlights of the sale include *Girl reading by a stream* by John Singer Sargent (estimate: £1,000,000-1,500,000) and *The White Canoe* by Sir Alfred James Munnings (estimate: £500,000-700,000). The evening sale will be followed by the *British Impressionism Day Sale* on 23 November. The works will be on view and open to the public from 18 November.

The sale complements Tate Britain's current exhibition, *Impressionists in London*, which highlights the French Impressionist painters who came to the capital to escape the Franco-Prussian War and explore the possibilities offered by the fastest-growing and wealthiest city of the period. Despite hostility from critics, their pictures of London and its environs introduced a new generation of artists in Britain to contemporary subject matter, and most importantly their emphasis on the transient effects of light.
